Profile of PE: We have now engaged with our SGO for the first time and as a result are using the kitemark as the spine to our achievements. The pupils are now familiar with this and understand the process of: PE/Sport (Introduction to a new skill) > Extra-Curricular club (Develop the skill further) > Representation (Selected to attend a competition). Broader Expereince: Our pupils are experiencing a wider range of provision and as a result the school have reached four county finas in Yr6 Boys rowing, Y5 Boys cricket, Y4 Tennis and Yr2 Gymnastics. Increased Particpation: By the end of 2017/2018, 110 different pupils (22% of the school – Y1-6) have represented the school in a competive fixture. In previous years we haven't tracked this, but this number hasn't been achieved in an academic year.
