#### What are SATs?



- The achievements of children in Year 2 and Year 6 are assessed at the end of Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2.
   The children sit national test papers.
- They measure children's understanding from across Key Stage 1 (Years 1 and 2)
- Assessment tests are written by examiners.
- The children complete them in school and they are marked by the teachers.

#### Timetable for SATs



- There is not a set timetable for Year 2 SATs.
- They MUST be undertaken during the month of May.
- •The teachers will decide when these take place, some will involve whole class testing, some will be small group and some will be individual.
- •These will fit in around the normal timetable and sometimes the children will not even know they are happening

#### **Tests**

- All children should be given the opportunity to take each test.
- It is up to the teacher to decide whether a child should take the test or complete the test.

#### What is tested?



There are 2 main areas that are tested

- Reading mainly the ability to understand and comprehend what has been read
- Maths this will involve a mental arithmetic paper and a reasoning paper.

Please note: There is NOT a writing 'test'. Assessments will be made based on the children's work produced in class. This includes handwriting, spelling, punctuation and grammar.

## Reading



- The reading test for Year 2 pupils will involve two separate papers:
- Paper 1 consists of a selection of texts totalling 400 to 700 words, with questions interspersed
- Paper 2 comprises a reading booklet of a selection of passages totalling
   800 to 1100 words. Children will write their answers in a separate booklet
- Each paper is worth 50 per cent of the marks, and should take around 30 minutes, but children will not be strictly timed, as the tests are not intended to assess children's ability to work at speed. The texts in the reading papers will cover a range of fiction, non-fiction and poetry, and will get progressively more difficult towards the end of the test. Teachers will have the option to stop the test at any point that they feel is appropriate for a particular child.

## Reading



- There will be a variety of question types:
- Multiple choice
- Ranking/ordering, e.g. 'Number the events below to show in which order they happened in the story'
- Matching, e.g. 'Match the character to the job that they do in the story'
- Labelling, e.g. 'Label the text to show the title'
- Find and copy, e.g. 'Find and copy one word that shows what the weather was like in the story'
- Short answer, e.g. 'What does the bear eat?'
- Open-ended answer, e.g. 'Why did Lucy write the letter to her grandmother? Give two reasons

#### **Maths**



- The Key Stage 1 maths test will comprise two papers:
- Paper 1: arithmetic, worth 25 marks and taking around 15 minutes.
- Paper 2: mathematical fluency, problem-solving and reasoning, worth 35 marks and taking 35 minutes, with a break if necessary. There will be a variety of question types: multiple choice, matching, true/false, constrained (e.g. completing a chart or table; drawing a shape) and less constrained (e.g. where children have to show or explain their method).
- Children will not be able to use any tools such as calculators or number lines.

# How will the tests be marked?



Although the tests are set externally, they will be marked by teachers within the school. Instead of the old national curriculum levels, children will be given a standardised score – although this may not be communicated to parents. Teacher assessments will also be used to build up a picture of your child's learning and achievements. In addition, your child will receive an overall result saying whether they have achieved the required standard in the tests. The Department for Education aims for 85 per cent of children to reach the required standard.

## Getting the results



- The tests are marked in school by the Year 2 teachers.
- They are then moderated by other teachers in school, sometimes they are moderated with teachers from other schools.
- The teachers also **teacher assess** the children to ensure these results match.
- All of these results are then moderated by the Senior Management Team.
- You will be given the results in your child's report –
   there will not be any surprises!
















## **Home Reading**



- Your child will read to their class teacher/learning support assistant at least once a week.
- Other members of staff e.g. DRA's will also listen to your children read.
- Your child should read at home as often as possible for no longer than 10 minutes.
- When challenges are set they should be completed at home to help develop understanding and reading skills.

## Reading diary



- There is a list of questions that you can ask your child when they have finished reading.
- When you have heard your child read please record this in the reading diary. Make a note of the pages read and how well they did/anything they struggled with.

## BUBBLE WORDS


Write your spelling words in bubble letters. After you have written them you can colour them in with crayons.


## Swimming kit


