Glossary of terms

Fred Talk: Fred is a puppet who can only say and read words in pure sounds; he cannot say the whole word. He never adds 'uh' after a consonant sound e.g. fuh, luh, muh. (A slight 'uh' cannot be helped when saying the sounds b, d, g, j, w and y)

Grapheme: one letter or one group of letters used to write one sound e.g.

The sound 'f' can be written with the grapheme f (fun) ff (huff) ph (photo)

The sound 'igh' can be written with the grapheme igh (night) or i (kind) or ie (tie)

Green words: Words made up of the graphemes listed in the sound boxes on page 4

Red words: Common words with a grapheme not listed in the sound boxes

Challenge words: Topical words particular to this story

Syllables: Chunks within long words

Root: The part of the word that gives the most meaning

How to use this book

Follow the advice, in italics, given for you on each page.

Support the children as they read the text that is shaded in cream.

Praise the children at every step!

Introduction

Discuss the term 'One good turn deserves another'. When has helping someone meant that something nice has happened to you in return?

A long, long time ago, in Roman times, a poor slave called Androcles runs away from his master. He finds a cave to sleep in but the cave is a lion's den. Androcles helps the lion and they become friends. After a while, Androcles decides to go back to his home. But he is thrown into prison by his master and made to fight lions in a lion pit (explain what a lion pit is like).

Soon, Androcles was feasting on fresh, raw meat, and the lion was gnawing the bones.


Androcles and the lion lived happily in the cave for many months.
