Glossary of terms

Fred Talk: Fred is a puppet who can only say and read words in pure sounds; he cannot say the whole word. He never adds 'uh' after a consonant sound e.g. fuh, luh, muh. (A slight 'uh' cannot be helped when saying the sounds b, d, g, j, w and y)

Grapheme: one letter or one group of letters used to write one sound e.g.

The sound 'f' can be written with the grapheme f (fun) ff (huff) ph (photo)

The sound 'igh' can be written with the grapheme igh (night) or i (kind) or ie (tie)

Green words: Words made up of the graphemes listed in the sound boxes on page 4

Red words: Common words with a grapheme not listed in the sound boxes

Challenge words: Topical words particular to this story

Syllables: Chunks within long words

Root: The part of the word that gives the most meaning

How to use this book

Follow the advice, in italics, given for you on each page.

Support the children as they read the text that is shaded in cream.

Praise the children at every step!



Looking after a hamster

Hamsters are cute little animals, with ginger fur and long whiskers.



If you are an animal lover,
you may want to become the proud owner of a hamster.
You can get one from a pet shop or an animal shelter.

Choosing a hamster

A girl hamster can have a litter of pups when she is 10 weeks old.

Your hamster must be at least 4-8 weeks old before it leaves its mother.



Remember! Choose a hamster with clean fur and bright eyes.

A home for your hamster

First, you will need a proper hamster cage - the bigger the better.

Put a layer of peat on the floor, and scatter wood shavings or shredded paper on top. When it is sleepy, your hamster will curl up in a corner and cover itself up.

Remember! Never keep hamsters together in the same cage - they will fight!



Hamster toys

Hamsters like to scamper about, discovering things to play with.

Get your hamster a hamster wheel.

Other toys can be made at home:



- tunnels made from loo roll tubes
- ladders made from bits of wood (hamsters are good climbers)
- little houses made from boxes.

Your hamster will also like to come out of its cage to play. Scoop it up in both hands and hold it gently but firmly next to your body.

Don't squeeze it - it may bite your finger!

Pick it up each day - it will soon get used to you.



Remember! Never leave a hamster alone in a room out of its cage. It might get lost or hurt, or it might chew a bit of electric flex.

Feeding your hamster

Give your hamster:

- pellets (from the pet shop)
- · bits of cornflake and bread
- currants, nuts and bits of cheese (for a treat)
- · fresh, clean water (hamsters get thirsty, too!).



You will need a bowl to put the food in. It must be heavy so the hamster can't turn it over. A sipper tube is best for the water.

Your hamster may stuff the food in its cheek pouches to eat later.

Remember! Take out stale food and dirt each day.

Clean the cage and change the bedding each week.

Keeping your hamster fit



Check your hamster each day.

Has it got a cold?

Is its bottom dirty?

Are its teeth or claws getting too long?

Is it getting thinner?

Is it bad-tempered?

Remember! Never let an animal suffer.

Take it to the vet if it is ill, so that he or she can make it better.
