Physical activity at Broad Heath.

At Broad Heath Primary School, we understand that physical activity is a pivotal aspect of a young person's development. It can help them with their social development, improve their mental health and even help improve knowledge acquisition in core subjects. Our commitment is clear to see, from our capital investment in our facilities, including a roofed games area and an all pitch, to 2 permanent staff in our school's PE department. These are commitments we have made as a school despite the continued PESSPA grant, which we aim to use to take our provision for Physical Education, School Sports and Physical activity from good to outstanding. When spending this budget, we are not only looking to bridge gap in terms of getting our students active in the short term, but also have a vision of what delivery will look like in the future.

School AIMS for Physical Education

Our P.E. curriculum has 3 main aims:

- To give the children physical competence, knowledge and understanding to take part in a range of physical activities.
- To give children the qualities to work with others and be the best person they can be.
- To inspire our children to be lifelong physical movers.

- Key indicator 3: Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- Key indicator 4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- Key indicator 5: Increased participation in competitive sport
